Ethical Considerations in a Multicultural World

Melba J. T. Vasquez, Ph.D., ABPP

This presentation will include key concepts from the “Guidelines on Multicultural Education, Training, Research, Practice and Organizational Change for Psychologists,” (APA, 2003) which were developed because *racial and ethnic diversity among clients/patients presents challenges for all of us*. We tend to relate most easily, in our lives, as well as in our practices, to those most similar to us, including in regard to the major variables of gender, ethnicity, and social class. This presentation will include the *ethical imperatives that underlie the importance of multicultural competence in psychotherapy with members of racial/ethnic minority groups, including immigrant and international groups*. Potential obstacles as well as positive strategies will be identified, especially those relevant for all practitioners wishing to provide competent ethical services to ethnic minority populations. Case vignettes from the presenter's own experience will be discussed.

Objectives: At the end of this workshop, participants will be able to:

- Recognize APA Ethics Code standards relevant to diverse populations.
- List two potential obstacles to providing competent services for members of diverse populations
- Identify two positive strategies based on multicultural and feminist ethics for increasing competency for delivery of services to diverse groups.

The Presenter:

Dr. Melba Vasquez is a psychologist in independent practice in Austin, Texas, and serves on the Board of Directors of the American Psychological Association. She is a past president of Texas Psychological Association and of APA Divisions 35 (Society of Psychology of Women) and 17 (Society of Counseling Psychology). She is a Fellow of the APA and holds the Diplomate of the American Board of Professional Psychology. She is a co-founder of APA Division 45 (Society of the Psychological Study of Ethnic Minority Issues) and of the National Multicultural Conference and Summit, held every two years for the last 10 years.

Dr. Vasquez publishes in the areas of ethics, ethnic minority psychology, psychology of women, training and supervision, and counseling and psychotherapy. She is co-author, with Ken Pope, of *Ethics in Psychotherapy & Counseling: a Practical Guide* (2007, 3rd edition) and of *How to survive and thrive as a therapist: Information, ideas and resources for psychologists in practice* (2005), and of over 65 journal articles and book chapters.

She has won several awards, including the 2008 Psychologist of the Year Award from APA Division 42 (Independent Practice), the 2008 “Friend of the Asian American Psychological Association” Award, the 2007 APA Award for Distinguished Contributions to Independent or Institutional Practice in the Private Sector, and the 2006 Woman of the Year from the APA Division 17 Section for the Advancement of Women. She is a 2009 candidate for APA President.

PANEL DISCUSSION IN THE AFTERNOON
Working With Men around the Issue of Domestic Violence

Our APA Ethics Code (APA, 2002) requires us to be attentive to issues of competence and discrimination in working with factors such as age, gender, gender identity, race, ethnicity, culture, national origin, religion, sexual orientation, disability, socioeconomic status, etc. The APA Multicultural Guidelines (APA, 2003) further suggest that working with those different from us presents unique challenges to which we must attend. Ethical responsibilities will be described when a woman of color works with a variety of clients, including white men and men of color, in psychotherapy.

Panel Participants: Kamana'opono Crabbe, Ph.D. , Joe Bloom, M-div, LSW, QCSW, Consistent with our theme of *Leading Through Tough Economic Times: Innovation, Collaboration and Advocacy*, a local panel of experts will individually address the impact of the rise of domestic violence at this time of national economic crisis and hardship and the practice and advocacy implications for psychologists in working with men around issues of interpersonal violence. Attending to the humanity of those with whom we work is a basic ethical task that applies in all cases. These principles will be discussed, and cases described.

Objectives: At the end of this workshop, participants will be able to describe:

- the social context as critical in understanding human behavior, especially for men.
- the impact of challenging economic times on domestic violence.
- the importance of attending to the humanity of those with whom we work as a method to move past negative stereotypes of clients.

IMPROVING MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE DELIVERY FOR PTSD

B. Christopher Frueh, Ph.D. & Karen J. Cusack, Ph.D.

This clinical workshop will address a wide range of theoretical and practical issues related to effective assessment and treatment of posttraumatic reactions, including posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD). The workshop will be divided into five sections: (1) definitions, conceptual issues, and epidemiology; (2) assessment strategies and approaches; (3) treatment of PTSD, with a heavy emphasis on cognitive-behavioral therapy for adults; (4) clinical issues related to clinical contexts/settings, ethno-racial minorities, special populations, and novel modes of service delivery relevant to rural communities; and (5) challenges and future directions for the field. Questions and discussion will be welcomed throughout the workshop.

Objectives: At the end of this workshop, participants will be able to:

- provide an overview of current evidence-based practices for servicing people with posttraumatic stress disorder or other post-traumatic reactions;
- introduce clinicians, program administrators, and researchers to the current clinical science of the assessment and treatment of PTSD in a variety of clinical practice settings;
- gain enhanced knowledge of important mental health service delivery issues relevant to trauma and PTSD in a range of clinical populations (e.g., primary care patients, adults with severe mental illness, veterans) and settings (rural, urban);
- gain enhanced knowledge of important mental health service delivery issues relevant to trauma and PTSD among ethno-racial minorities.

The Presenters:

B. Christopher Frueh, Ph.D. Dr. Frueh is a clinical psychologist and currently a tenured Professor of Psychology and Director of the Division of Social Sciences at the University of Hawaii, Hilo, HI, and Director of Clinical Research at The Menninger Clinic, Houston, TX. His research focuses on clinical trials and mental health service delivery in a variety of medical and mental health settings, including rural outreach via telemedicine approaches. Over the past 17 years, he has been Principal Investigator on 12 federally-funded research grants and Co-Investigator on about 15 others, from funding agencies like National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), Agency for Healthcare Quality and Research (AHQR), Veterans Affairs (VA), and Department of Defense (DOD).

Karen J. Cusack, Ph.D. Dr. Cusack is a Research Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and a Research Fellow with the Cecil G. Sheps Center for Health Services Research at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. She has worked extensively in the field of Trauma research and specifically on improving PTSD service delivery systems among public sector consumers with severe mental illness. She is currently the PI on an NIMH grant entitled, "PTSD and Dual Disorders at the interface of the Mental Health and Criminal Justice Systems," as well as a second grant entitled, "In-Jail Trauma Intervention for Mentally Ill Detainees with Co-occurring Disorders."

**Why Exposure?
A Brief Look at the Evidence-based Theoretical Foundations –
Emotion Processing Theory
How To Do Exposure**

A. Aukahi Austin, Ph.D. & Brad J. Nakamura, Ph.D.

Exposure Therapy is a treatment approach that is a well known, evidence-based practice in psychology yet it may not be widely used in the treatment of anxiety. In this workshop, clinicians, teachers, and researchers will present on Exposure Therapy for Anxiety beginning from the theory behind its use and continuing through the basic steps in doing exposure therapy with clients. Strategies for applying Exposure Therapy with different populations including children and culturally diverse communities; problem areas including trauma, panic disorder, and bulimia; and settings including rural areas, primary care, and non-specialty settings will be reviewed. Presenters will also discuss factors that prevent clinicians from using Exposure Therapy with their clients and suggest strategies. The presentation will include case examples, live demonstrations, and rehearsal.

Objectives: At the end of the two-part program participants will be able to:

- describe the theoretical foundations and evidence base for Exposure Therapy for Anxiety
- have increased knowledge of how to implement the basic procedures of Exposure Therapy
- be aware of barriers to implementation and strategies for addressing them
- discuss the use of exposure therapy across different problem areas, populations and settings.

The Presenters:

A. Aukahi Austin, Ph.D. Dr. Austin is a Licensed Clinical Psychologist at the Waimānalo Health Center Integrated Behavioral Health Program and the Executive Director of I Ola Lāhui Rural Hawai'i Behavioral Health Psychology Training Program. Dr. Austin is a generalist practitioner who emphasizes motivation for change and the use of culturally-minded evidence based practice. Dr. Austin received her Ph.D. in clinical psychology from the Clinical Studies Program at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa in 2004. She was trained in health psychology and behavioral medicine at Tripler Army Medical Center and completed a post-doctoral fellowship at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa Department of Psychology as Co-Director of a clinical trial of evidence based practices for children and adolescents where she was trained in Exposure Therapy. Dr. Austin has used Exposure Therapy in the treatment of anxiety and related conditions with diverse clients in a variety of treatment settings.

Brad J. Nakamura, Ph.D.

Dr. Nakamura is a second-year Assistant Professor at the University of Hawaii at Mānoa. His applied research and clinical interests include anxiety disorders among children and adolescents and disseminating and implementing evidence-based treatments in public sector direct service settings. Dr. Nakamura is currently a co-director (along with Dr. Charles Mueller) of the Center for Cognitive Behavior Therapy at the University of Hawaii Mānoa, a research, training, and therapy clinic that specializes in both internalizing and youth externalizing disorders. Currently he is also the co-chair (along with Dr. Martin Hirsch) of the State of Hawai'i Child and Adolescent Mental Health Division's (CAMHD) Evidence-Based Services (EBS) Committee, an interdisciplinary network focused on promoting evidence-based practices within our system of care. Dr. Nakamura is also chair of the Dissemination and Implementation Science Special Interest Group, a national committee (housed within the Association for Cognitive and Behavioral Therapies) whose mission is to promote research on how to better disseminate and implement evidence based practices.
